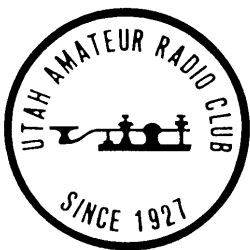




Mark Richardson, W7PHW gave us a very informative presentation on his collection of antique radios.

Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 101.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$15 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. The *Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$15 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Send dues to the Club Secretary: Dick Keddington, KD7TDZ, 1992 El Dorado Drive, Holladay, UT 84124-1652. ARRL membership renewals should specify ARRL Club #1602.

Contributions: Monetary contributions are gladly accepted. Send directly to the Club Treasurer: Chuck Johnson, 1612 W. 4915 S. Taylorsville, UT 84123-4244. For in kind contributions, please contact any board member to make appropriate arrangements.

Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities on both the Orem exchange (covering Santequin to Lehi) and the Salt Lake City exchange (covering Draper to Layton). The 449.10 repeater has autopatch facilities into Salt Lake City only available to UARC members. Due to the volume of traffic, only mobiles should use this autopatch. Autopatch use is open to all visitors to our area and to all club members. Non-members who wish to use the autopatch are encouraged to help with the cost of maintaining the equipment by joining the club.

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club, testing, meeting, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message on the answering machine, and your call will be returned.

Publication: The *Microvolt* is the official publication of the club. Deadline for submissions to the *Microvolt* is the 10th of each month prior to publication. 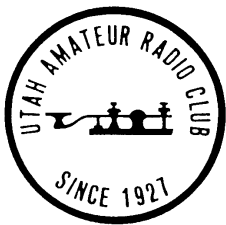

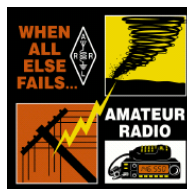

January Meeting: What Can ARRL Do For You?

Most hams have heard of ARRL —The American Radio Relay League—but some may have only a vague idea of just what it is. We'll be starting the new year with a program where you can find out just about everything you've wanted to know about ARRL and why it benefits all of us. Our January 5 meeting will feature your Utah Section Manager, Mel Parkes, AC7CP, who will give us the benefit of this ARRL knowledge.

Besides publishing *QST* magazine, ARRL sponsors some of the best known contest and awards such as Field Day, Sweepstakes, Worked All States, and DX Century Club. The Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) and the National Traffic System (NTS) were organized by ARRL. The League also offers its members technical help and advice in cases where there is legal difficulty erecting antennas.

Probably the most important ARRL activity is its lobbying at the federal level against adverse laws and regulations. It is currently very active in the fight to keep BPL (Broadband Internet over Power Lines) from operating in a way that interferes with the amateur spectrum.

P. Hal Bergeson, WOMXY, SK

Jim, K7CQM, brings us word of the passing of Hal Bergeson, W0MXY. He died on November 14 of colon cancer at the age of 64. Hal had been living in Colorado for quite a number of years but grew up in Lewiston, Utah (Cache County) and is remembered by many as K7GOG from the 50s and 60s. Jim writes: Although Hal lived in Colorado, he grew up in Utah State University as K7GOG.

Hal was very active in Colorado VHF groups, always sending me e-mails about 6-meter openings with interests all the way up to 10 GHz. On the low

bands he was usually found on 20, 40 and 15 meters and usually on QRP CW. He



was a fantastic photographer. His photographs have been on the cover of QST and in CQ magazine as well as many commercial magazines. I went to school with Hal at

Utah State and so could go on with 40 years of memories.

Newsline reports that Hal for several years was a co-holder with W0LD of the 24 GHz U.S. distance record from Pikes Peak. He operated with WB0DRL contest station in the 1990's and served as vice-president of Central States VHF Society in 1995. He also co-hosted the conference held in Colorado Springs that year. Dr. Bergeson also helped lead a successful campaign to keep amateur radio towers and antennas legal in Colorado.
