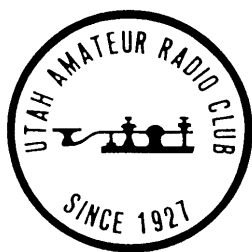

Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 101.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. The *Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Contributions: Monetary contributions are gladly accepted. Send directly to the Club Treasurer: Chuck Johnson, 1612 W. 4915 S. Taylorsville, UT 84123-4244. For in kind contributions, please contact any board member to make appropriate arrangements.

Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities on both the Orem exchange (covering Santequin to Lehi) and the Salt Lake City exchange (covering Draper to Layton). The 449.10 repeater has autopatch facilities into Salt Lake City only available to UARC members. Due to the volume of traffic, only mobiles should use this autopatch. Autopatch use is open to all visitors to our area and to all club members. Non-members who wish to use the autopatch are encouraged to help with the cost of maintaining the equipment by joining the club.

Ham Hot-Line: The Utah Amateur Radio Club (UARC) has a Ham Hotline, 583-3002. Information regarding Amateur Radio can be obtained, including club, testing, meeting, and membership information. If no one answers leave your name, telephone number and a short message on the answering machine, and your call will be returned.

Publication: *The Microvolt* is the official publication of the club. Deadline for submissions to the *Microvolt* is the 10th of each month prior to publication. 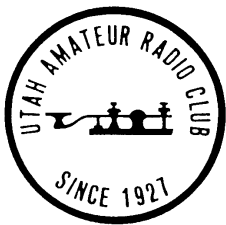

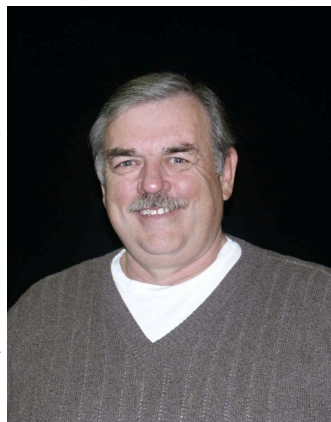

Member of the Month

This month we are featuring Arthur Harmon, KB7WVI. Arthur has been in the hobby for 13 years. He has always been interested in radio. He used to be a CB'er, but that got old after a while. It was Arthur's co-worker at Hill Air Force Base, David Horne, WA7LJU, who convinced him to get in to amateur radio.

Arthur worked for Hill Air Force base for 42 years. He operated heavy equipment. Towards the end of his career they did away with his job.

They put Arthur to work in the motor pool where he would operate shuttles on base. This is when Arthur met David Horne. They would carpool to work every day. They did this for about five years and became very good friends.

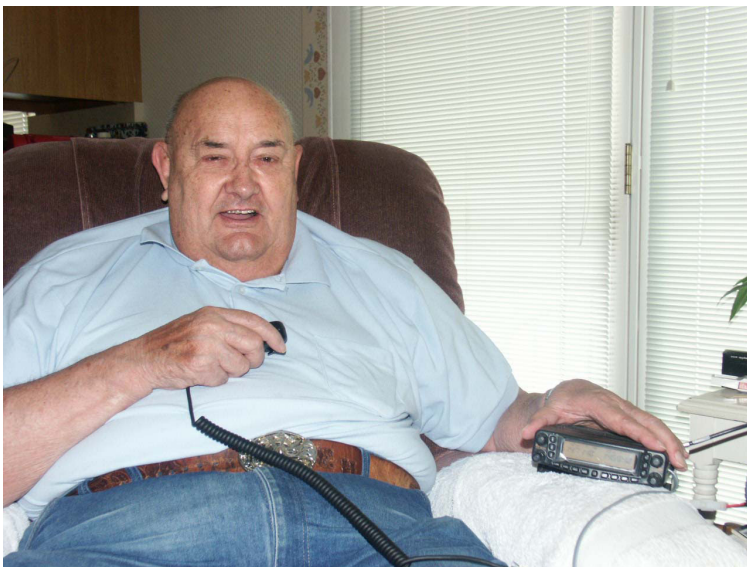
After retiring from Hill Air Force base in 1990, Arthur got a job with Lewis Brothers Stage driving tour busses. An incident happened that sparked art's interest in amateur radio even more. An LDS stake in Salt Lake City chartered a bus to take a group to go to the Mormon Miracle Pageant in Manti. They were 30 miles away from Manti when the bus broke down. One of the passengers got on her handheld radio and was able to contact someone on the Triple 6 repeater. A resident of Manti called the sheriff's department and they contacted Lewis Brothers Stages.

Arthur came to the rescue. He was really impressed with the role that a amateur radio played in helping with this emergency. The passenger let Art talk on

the ham radio as a third party. That is how I became acquainted with Arthur. I was already in Manti and I talked to them as they were making their way to Manti.

Finally three years later Arthur obtained his Technician license In July 1993. Arthur joined UARC and paid his dues at the Steak Fry that year and has been a member of UARC to this day. He is also a member of the VHF Society. After obtaining his license Art said his Yeasu 530 became his best friend. When driving around he could get directions and go right to it. It was great company for him when driving the tour buses.

Of course, he didn't use it while driving the passengers, but during those wait times it was a great companion. Even now Art says ham radio is his best friend especially since his children are grown and his wife Ruth has passed away. It has



been 11 years since her passing. Art has three children: two girls and one boy. He could never get them interested in amateur radio. Art's favorite thing about amateur radio is talking all over the world. He is very active on IRLP. Arthur has contacts in Canada, Australia, Holland and England. Art says that Holland and England are flat lands. They are about 120 feet above sea level so they aren't use to our mountains. Art sends them pictures of our mountains by way of the computer and they send him pictures of their lands. One of his contacts from Canada will be coming to the United States and he might get to meet them in person. Arthur even talks to Japan. His friend David Horne, WA7LJU, has a repeater on one of the islands.
