Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 103.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Repeaters: UARC maintains the 146.62- and 146.76- repeaters. The repeaters are administered by the UARC Repeater Committee. Comments and questions may be directed to any Committee member. The Lake Mountain repeater (146.76-) has autopatch facilities for Provo which are currently disabled due to abuse and for Salt Lake which is in need of reworking to be compatible with IRLP



Arlene likes to read. She is now working on a master's degree in elementary education. She is taking the class on line through Western Governors University.


Arlene, we wish you the best in all of your endeavors especially getting that General class license.

John, K7VE, showed us his brass key he put together from a kit. He said the kit sells for approximately \$65.




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> If the download does not start in 10 seconds select Utah Repeaters You must have Google Earth installed on your computer.

Picture at left: Clint, KA7OEI, showed us his NIMH battery float charger that he put together on a scrap piece of wood. This will float charge 48 AA batteries.

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

UARC—50+ Years Old

50 years ago, the Utah Amateur Radio Club incorporated in the state of Utah. In that affidavit, it was stated "Said association shall be known as the Utah Amateur Radio Club, Incorporated, and shall have a life of fifty (50) years, unless sooner terminated by act of the membership or by action of law" This document was filed with the state on November 14, 1957.

The UARC Board of Directors recently filed an amendment which says, "Be it resolved that the life of the entity be amended to be perpetual."

Per the UARC Bylaws we need to have the membership of the club vote on this and ratify this amendment to the affidavit. Please come to the December meeting and vote on this ratification.
