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Prologue

The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City Area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah Engineering and Mines Classroom (EMCB) building, Room 103.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. APRS—How To Get Your Feet Wet—At No Cost!

APRS – Automatic Packet Reporting System is an amateur radio based digital communications system used for local, tactical, real-time exchange of information among all members of a net, including map based displays for situational awareness. It was developed by Bob Bruninga, WB4APR, who currently works at the United States Naval Academy. *Capabilities:*

APRS is used to transmit real-time information such as messages, bulletins, announcements and the locations of any stations or objects via amateur packet radio protocols. Real-time reporting of station position for mobiles is facilitated using the Global Positioning System. APRS is capable of transmitting a wide variety of data including weather reports, short text messages, radio direction finding bearings, telemetry data, and storm forecasts. These reports can be combined with a computer and mapping software to show the transmitted data superimposed on a variety of map displays.

I've been asked on several occasions on how to get started with the APRS system, and I think this is your roadmap on getting started, and what you have to do to start understanding and having fun.

How It Works:

An object (Vehicle, House, Balloon, Weather Station, Weather Storm, Bicycle, etc.) has a location and uses amateur radio to automatically (or someone acting on behalf of the object) to send information, including the Longitude / Latitude of said object to other stations on the system.

In this article I will be focusing on how to set up a home monitoring station using the Internet that will allow you to participate in the network of APRS stations, send messages, view up to the minute weather data, and track moving APRS objects. All of these things could be quite useful in the event of an emergency situation to a net control station wanting to use the closest information or resources for a specific purpose.

The best part is that you'll be able to achieve all of this at little or no additional cost using your home computer, your internet connection, some free software and a little of your time to learn and play with the programs. Let's get started!

The Program(s):

You'll be downloading a copy of a program called UI-VIEW. (http://www.ui-view.org/) You'll be looking for the download section, and a file called 32full203.exe (5.02MB). (This is the 2.03 version available at the time of this writing.) There is also a 16 bit version that will work on computers with less horsepower, but I will be focusing only on the 32 bit version that most hams will want to load into their Windows 98/XP equipped computers.

While you are downloading the software, skip over to http://home.planet.nl/~chrisvangorp/ -- Here you will be downloading a file called the PA7RHMsvr map server.

(pa7rhmsvr107.exe – It's only 355KB) This will supply an unlimited supply of maps to your APRS station.

The Registration:

UI-VIEW used to be a shareware program, and well worth every penny. Roger Barker, G4IDE (the author) became a silent key on September 8, 2004. Roger was the author of WinPack, UI-View and UI-View32, as well as other programs. Just before Roger G4IDE passed away, the registration fees for UI-View and WinPack were waived, but it is asked that you make a donation to your local or national cancer agency. For registration of UI-View32, you must now visit the website of M0CYP.

http://www.apritch.myby.co.uk/uiv32.htm Enter your callsign and name and then click on the registrar that lives the closest to you. Andy also has some great "addons" for UI-View & UI-View32.

After you register the software, you will get 2 numbers – One to activate the software, and one to get into the various APRS servers. Please write them down and keep the handy for the install process.

The last bit of information you'll need now is your location of your station in Longitude / Latitude. QRZ.com will give you a rough estimate of the location of your FCC mailing address.



UI-View - A Great APRS program for FREE!

It was playing with APRS that I first learned that longitude and latitude are not all created equal. The location in QRZ.com is a decimal number, whereas UIVIEW favors the more traditional degrees, minutes and decimal minutes. Since 60 seconds=1 minute and 60 minutes=1 degree, this can easily be done on a calculator, but there is a great little calculator online you can use that will make light work of the calculations. This is pro-

vided by the Bureau of Economic Geology website: http://www.beg.utexas.edu/GIS/tools/dd_dms.htm Here's an example:

QRZ says my station coordinates are: 41.1592 and -81.233115. In North America that would be North and West respectively. The program on the BEG website says it calculates out to: 41 Degrees, 09 minutes and 33.1 seconds and -081 Degrees N Latitude, 13 Minutes and 59.21 seconds W Longitude.

UI-VIEW is going to ask for your station latitude in the format dd.mm.nn<NS>. "dd" is two digits for degrees. "mm" is two digits for minutes. "nn" is two digits for decimal minutes. NOTE - decimal minutes, not seconds. " (That means that whatever figure you have for seconds has to be divided by 60) Followed by <NS> -- which is either "N" for North or "S for South.

My latitude would them become: 41.09.55N

Same formula applies to Longitude - The format isddd.mm.nn<EW>. "ddd" is three digits for degrees. "mm" is two digits for minutes. "nn" is two digits for decimal minutes. NOTE - decimal minutes, not seconds. (Divide your answer by 60) followed by <EW> which is either "E" for East or "W" for West.

My longitude would them become: -081.13.98W

Note: This is going to get you in your neighborhood. The BEST way to calculate your location is by using a GPS receiver. That will make you accurate to within a few feet. Either way – This will get you close enough to get started.

Putting it all together:

Lets put it all together now.

- 1. Install the UI-VIEW32 program and run it. Provided you didn't get any error messages during installation, proceed to step 2.
- 2. Open "Setup", "Station Setup". There's a place for your CALLSIGN, LATTITUDE and LONGITUDE. Your GRID SQUARE information will be calculated. Leave the PORT, UNPROTO ADDRESS and COMMENT alone for now. Make sure the UI-VIEW Tag is checked. Look for the SYMBOL dropdown and choose a picture that represents who or what you are. Most folks choose HOME or HOME(HF). Once you've done that, you should have a working program!

Of course, the maps that come with UI-VIEW are from the UK, so your going to need some local maps. As long as we are going to connect to the Internet for our information, we are going to now install our map server we downloaded earlier.

Run the pa7rhmsvr107.exe program and follow the instructions on the screen. After the program is installed, go back to the UI-VIEW program and open

"MAP", "Load a MAP." Select the map called "_PA&RHMsvr." That's all there is to it. You can now navigate around the entire world by using the arrows that will appear when you put your mouse near the edge of the map (Double Click on the arrow.) or by using the Page UP and Page DOWN keys to zoom in or out. You can view any map from the entire world, continent, state, down to street level maps.

If you navigate to a view near your station you will see your STATION ICON on the map. If you place your mouse cursor over your station, you will see all of your station information in a pop up.

The last thing your going to want to do in your installation is establish 2 way communication between UI-VIEW and the APRS world. He we are going to establish the connection by using the Internet itself. You could also use a 2m radio, but for now were going to concentrate on using an international APRS Internet server. These are stations that take station data from "on the air" sources and compile and send the information over the internet. Our station will also take our station data and send it's location to the server so your station will appear on everybody else's map too.

1. From the UI-VIEW program open "FILE", "Download APRS Server List." The information that is in the box is old and inaccurate. Replace the address in the box with: france.aprs2.net/APRServe2.txt

Make sure you're connected to the Internet and select DOWNLOAD. The program will now fetch a list of current servers available to you.

- 2. Pull down Setup and select APRS Server Setup. There should be a bunch of APRS servers present. Select one that's close to you. (Anywhere in the US is fine.)
- 3. Place your server validation number in the box provided from the info you obtained when registering your copy of UI-View.
- 4. In the extra log-on text box type in r/41/081/150 This limits the server to sending you APRS info in a radius of 150 miles from Northeast Ohio. The first numbers are you LONG and LAT with the third number being the radius from that point. If you don't do this, the server will try to send you ALL traffic from around the globe.

Finally. Close the window and select Action, Connect to APRS server. If all went well you should see server activity on your status area, and stations should start appearing on your Display. You should also see YOUR station on your map as well.

Going Further

Your going to want to read the help text to learn about all of the APRS and UI-View features available. There is also a YAHOO discussion group called "UIView" that has TONS of information, as well as any question you can think of. It's a great source of information.

This is enough to get your feet wet and explore, and get you started in another fascinating facet of the Amateur Radio hobby! As always, I am available to help. Enjoy!

JOTA Oct. 19-20,2008


