

Club: The Utah Amateur Radio Club was organized under its present name in 1927, although its beginnings may date back as early as 1909. In 1928, it became affiliated with the American Radio Relay League (club #1602) and is a non-profit organization under the laws of Utah. It holds a club station license with the call W7SP, a memorial call for Leonard (Zim) Zimmerman, an amateur radio pioneer in the Salt Lake City area.

Meetings: The club meets each month except July and August. The meetings are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7:30 PM in the University of Utah's Warnock Engineering Building, generally in room 1230 or 2230, sometimes in 2250 or 105.

Membership: Club membership is open to anyone interested in amateur radio; a current license is not required. Dues are \$17 per year, including a *Microvolt* subscription. *The Microvolt* and membership cannot be separated. Those living at the same address as a member who has paid \$17 may obtain a membership without a *Microvolt* subscription for \$9. Latest News

Our Cover

Our cover this month is a collage of devices and waveforms from our November meeting about early radio. Upper left is an oscillograph of a damped-wave transmission, showing how different it is from a continuous wave (CW) transmission. In the upper right is a "coherer," possibly the earliest kind of radio receiver (although this is a recently built one). Below it is a diagram of the coherer circuit used for the demonstation. Center left is the spark from a spark-gap transmitter. At the bottom are devices

that generate damped waves: a tuning fork, and a "sparkless spark transmitter." The latter generates a tone signal audible on an A.M. broadcast. receiver, even though the only thing with broadcast band current is a simple tuned circuit.

Parking at the "U"

While he was parking for our November meeting at the University of Utah, a bright-eyed UARC member spotted signs on the parking lots near our meeting place saying that parking rules (only vehicles with certain stickers allowed) would be enforced until 8 P.M. (instead of the previous 6 P.M.). This caused some momentary terror. Would we all find our cars ticketed? Fortunately, that wasn't the case, but we did inquire and got more information.

The most important thing to know immediately is that the new hours won't be enforced until June of 2015. The University is hoping to collect some parking fees for those taking evening classes. The signs are a bit ahead of the new policy's implementation, as all the details haven't been worked out yet.

To allow folks to park for UARC meetings without getting ticketed the club will need to pay a "special event" fee for each meeting. The exact amount of the fee hasn't been determined yet, but is expected to be somewhere between \$20 and \$50.

Our treasurer, Chuck Johnson, WA7JOS, tells us that our finances are in good enough shape that we can afford the expense through the end of 2015. At that point we can look at the situation again to see if a small dues increase might be necessary.

When enforcement does go into effect, the Board will make sure it is announced in *The Microvolt* and on the web site which parking lot or lots our members need to use to avoid fines.

One might ask why we don't simply find another place to meet. The officers who went through the search last time we needed a new venue don't want to have to go through it again. Other facilities less well equipped than our rooms at the University often go for \$150-200 per use, so even at \$50 for parking, the University is still a bargain.

Until June, though, don't worry about the signs that say "8 P.M."

2014 Utah Field Day Results

The results from Field Day last June are in and UARC was the highest scorer from Utah this year. We have to qualify that by saying our score did not come close to those posted by other clubs in previous years, or even go as high as our own score in 2012. Our success was more due to a lack of normal competition than to a great improvement in our own operation. Still, we are happy to accept success however it comes.

It seems that the Utah DX Association had a problem finding a large enough supply of operators, while the Davis County club, for some reason, did not submit an entry. Thus, two of our usual biggest competitors had problems this year.

It is not very meaningful to compare raw scores of stations in different entry classes. Even with multiplier advantage, a single operator in the fivewatt battery class can't be expected to make as many contacts as a club running three or four transmitters at 100 watts each. The best way we have found to compare stations is by using their percentile within their operating classes. An entry's percentile is the percentage of entries that scored lower. For example, UARC entered the 3A class, meaning three simultaneous transmitters operated portable by a club or group. It was 38^{th} place among the 315 3A stations in the country. That means 277 stations (315 – 38) scored lower than we did. So our percentile is 277/315 = 87.9.

With all that said, we came out on top in both percentile and raw score. Thanks to all the operators and those who helped in other ways, such as setup/teardown, hauling equipment to and from the site, preparing Saturday dinner, logging, and getting Forest Service approval for the operation. We hope everyone had a good time.
